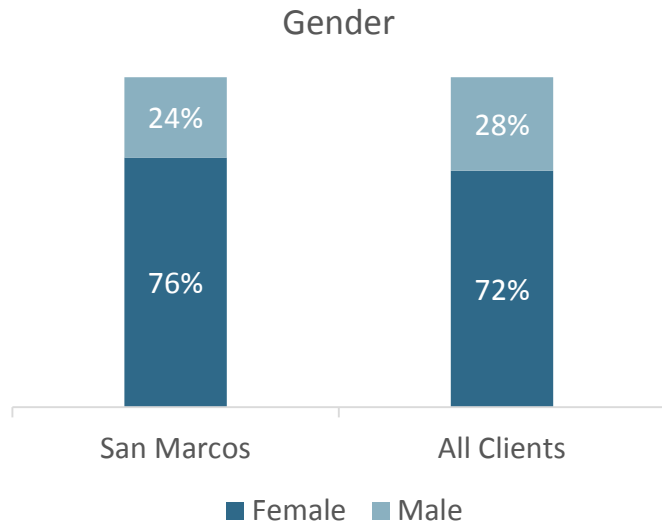
1,062 needs presented

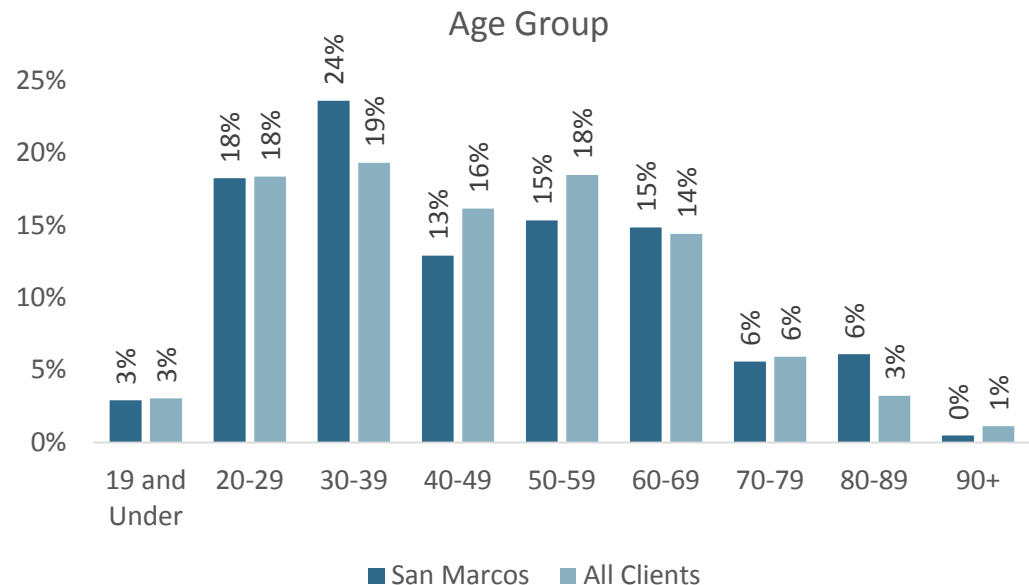
- In Quarter 4, April 2016 to June 2016, 2-1-1 San Diego created 694 cases for clients who resided in San Marcos (zip codes 92069, 92078, 92079, or 92096).
- These clients presented 1,062 needs, which resulted in a 1,247 referrals to services to address these needs.

The majority of San Marcos clients are female



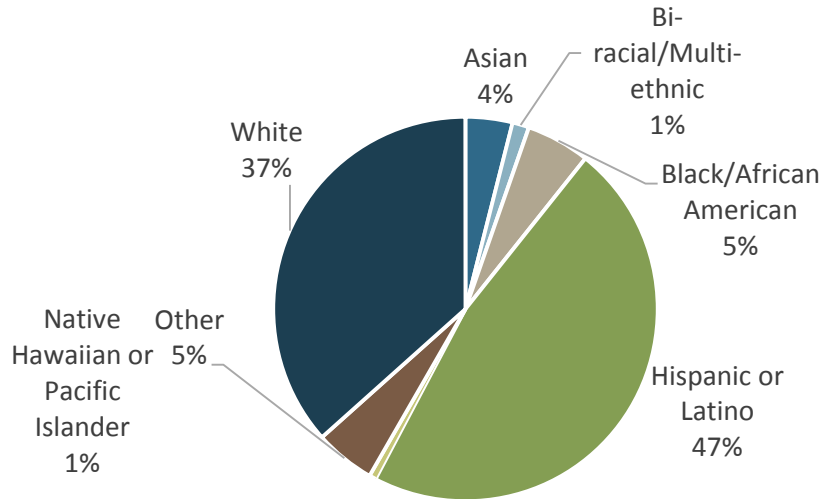
76% of clients who called from San Marcos are **women**, which is higher than the total population of 2-1-1 clients (72%).

Clients from San Marcos represent roughly the same age groups as the total population of 2-1-1 clients. There is a slightly larger population of clients between 30 and 39 from San Marcos, as compared to the total population of 2-1-1 clients.



Nearly half of San Marcos clients are Hispanic or Latino

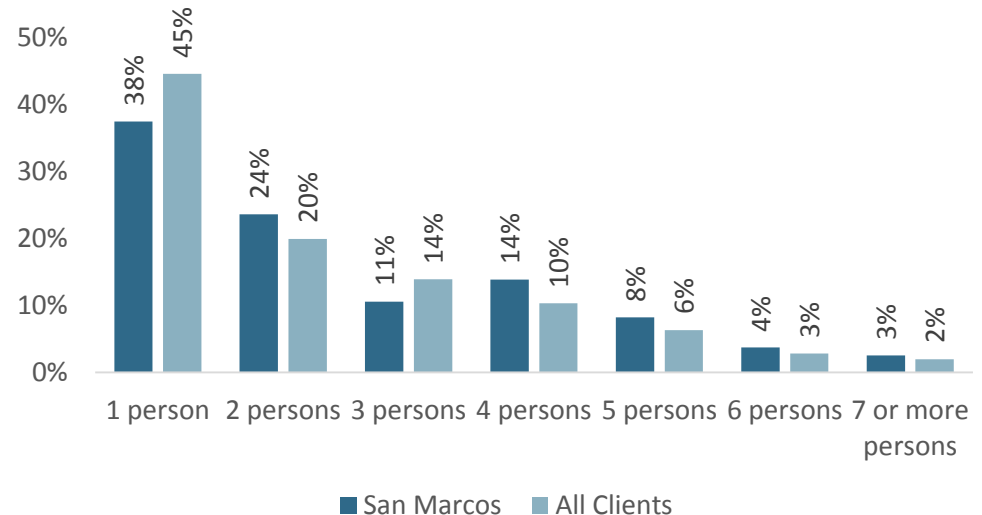
Race/Ethnicity of San Marcos Clients



Nearly half (47%) of the clients from San Marcos are **Hispanic or Latino**, which is higher than the total population of 2-1-1 clients (34%). Additionally, only 5% of the San Marcos clients are Black/African American, which is much lower than the total population of 2-1-1 clients (18%).

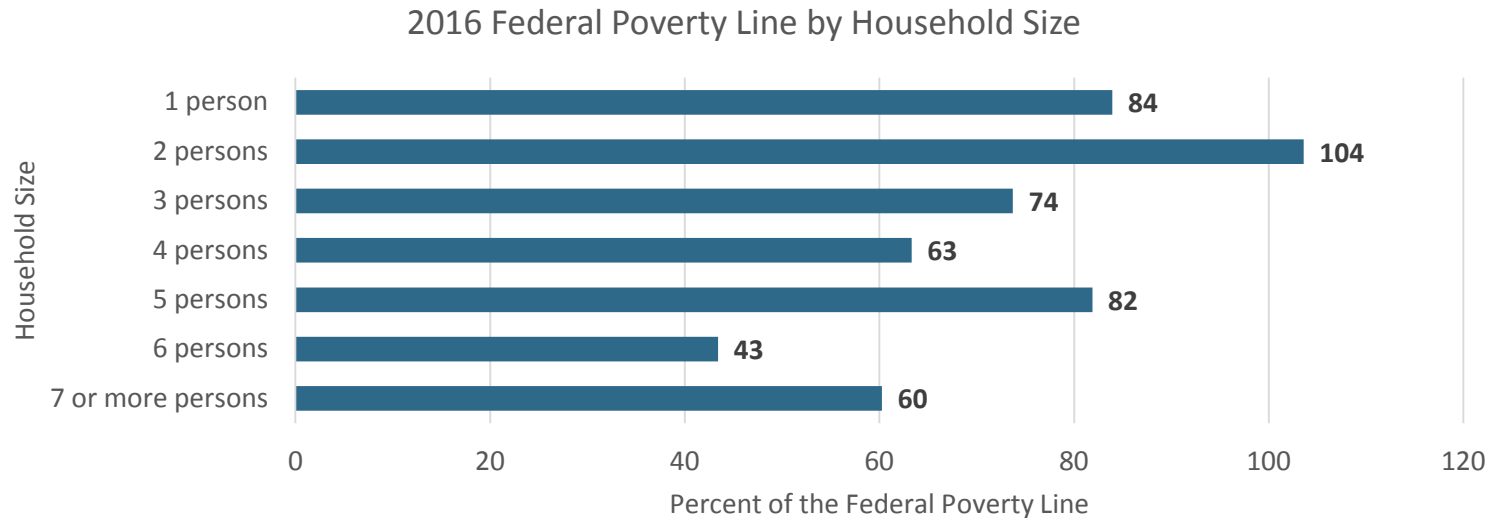
38% of San Marcos clients reside in **one person households**, which is lower than the total population of 2-1-1 clients (45%). Clients from San Marcos show a slightly higher representation among households with two or more persons than the total population of 2-1-1 clients.

All demographic data is out of total known responses.

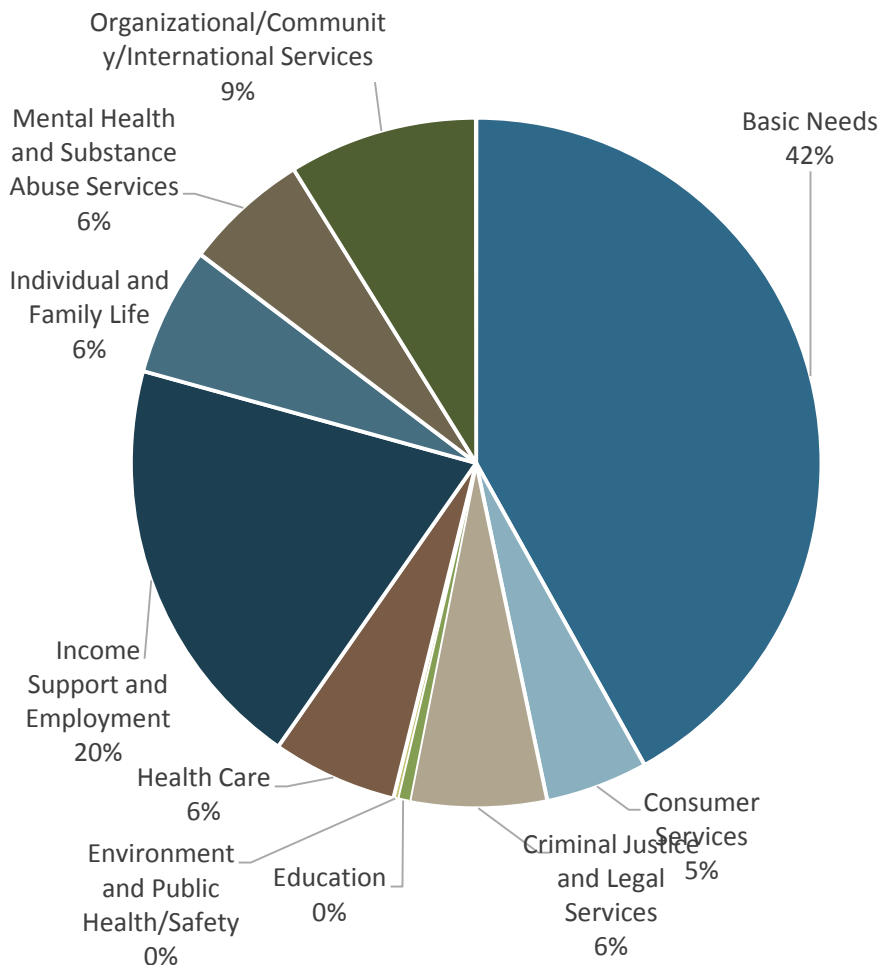
San Marcos clients show incomes much lower than the Federal Poverty Line



- On average, San Marcos clients were at 82% of the 2016 Federal Poverty Line.
- 38% of clients indicated that they were disabled, which is slightly lower than the total population of 2-1-1 clients (41%).
- 83% of clients stated they had health insurance, which is about the same as the total population of 2-1-1 clients (84%).

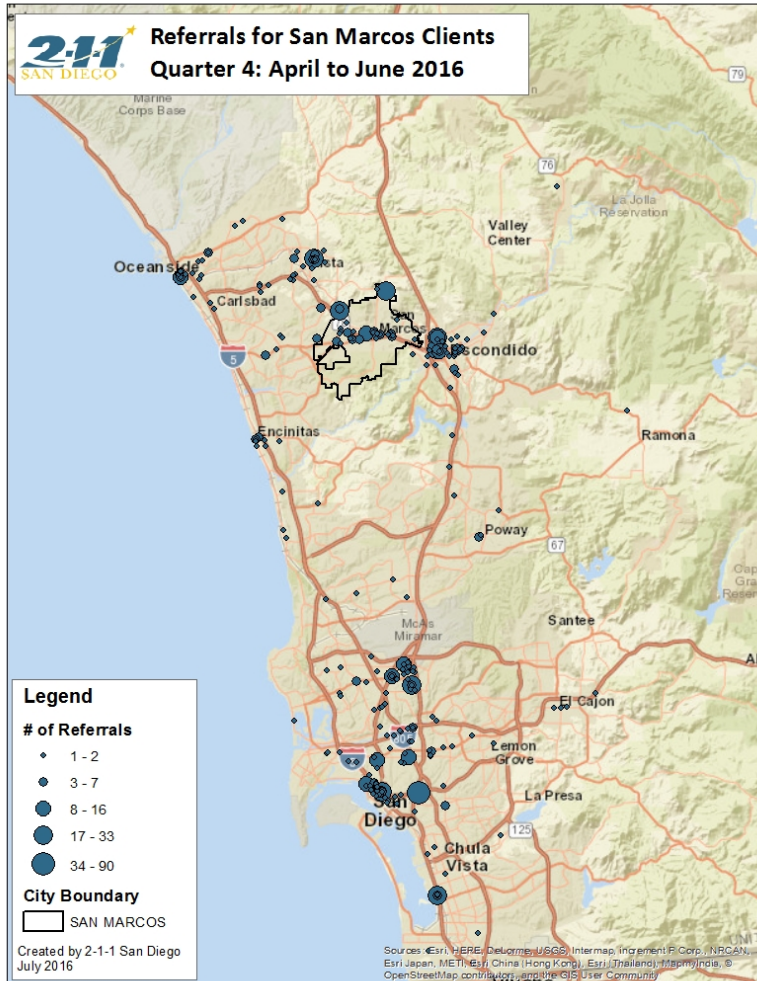

Clients from San Marcos received referrals to agencies and services across San Diego county. The map highlights where clients were referred to, with the size of the circles representing the number of referrals to that service.

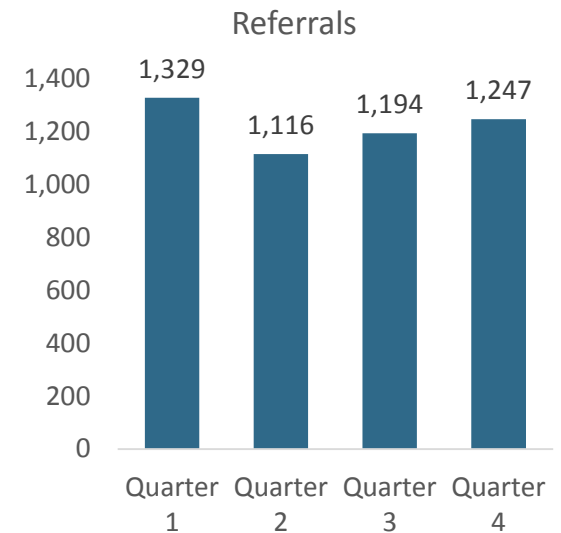
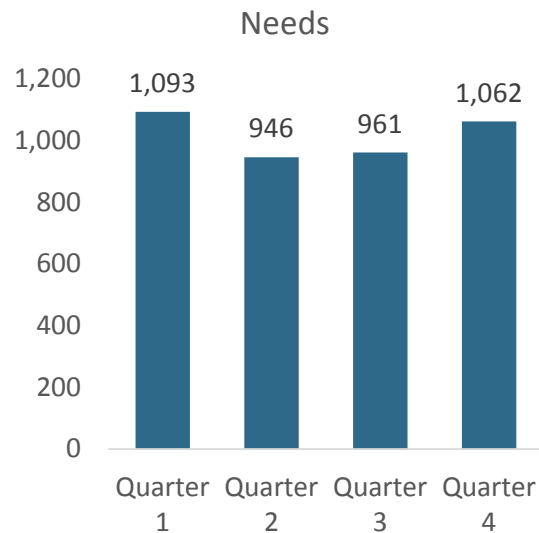
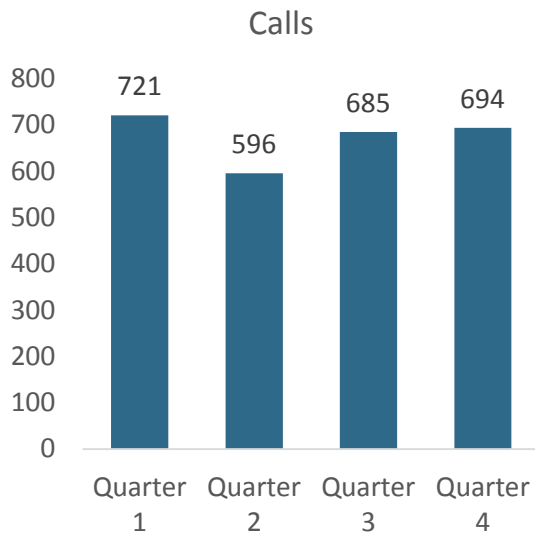

Dear San Marcos Community Foundation Board of Directors,

Thank you for your recent gift to the California State University San Marcos (CSUSM) Foundation for the Arts & Lectures Signature Event.

Our grant proposal stated that the gift would fund the 2017 Arts & Lectures Signature Event, a lecture by Dr. Alfredo Quinones-Hinojosa entitled: Becoming Dr. Q: My Journey from Migrant Farm Worker to Brain Surgeon. Unfortunately, due to a scheduling conflict, Dr. Quinones-Hinojosa is no longer able to give the lecture.

Instead, for the Spring 2017 Signature Event, Arts & Lectures will feature Dr. Lydia Villa-Komaroff. Dr. Lydia Villa-Komaroff is one of America's leading Latina scientists, and is the third Mexican-American woman in the U.S. to get a doctorate degree in the sciences. She is also a co-founding member of The Society for the Advancement of Chicanos/Hispanics and Native Americans in Science (SACNAS). Her most notable discovery was in 1978 during her post-doctoral research, when she was part of a team that discovered how bacterial cells could be used to generate insulin. She also contributed to the discovery that a molecule known to be associated with Alzheimer's disease (amyloid beta) causes degeneration of brain cells. The paper noting this discovery provided the first direct evidence that a fragment of the amyloid precursor protein could kill neurons, and helped stimulate a very large field within medical practice dedicated to preventing and treating Alzheimer's disease by targeting amyloid beta. She has served as a senior executive and board member of several biotechnology companies and is a great community leader.

March 2017 will mark the 20th anniversary of the statue installation and naming of Cesar Chavez Plaza at CSUSM, a meaningful landmark on campus for the CSUSM community. To this end, the CSUSM Foundation would like to use the gift from the San Marcos Community Foundation to fund a portion of the 2017 Arts & Lectures Signature Event: a lecture by Dr. Lydia Villa-Komaroff. As a leader of Mexican heritage, the lecture by Dr. Villa-Komaroff aligns with the spirit of this week-long celebration uplifting the culture and recognizing the valued impact of our Hispanic community leaders. As outlined in the previous proposal, this Arts & Lectures Signature Event's goals remain the same: to inspire, motivate, and support learning for students and the community, and to provide access to San Marcos for events that might not otherwise be offered to the region.

The CSUSM Foundation will adhere to all other contractual obligations as outlined by the grant agreement. The number of events is determined by Arts & Lectures' academic year funding from the department of Instructionally Related Activities on campus. Arts & Lectures provides the speaker or artist stipend, space for the event at CSUSM, and publicity for the event in a semester brochure and on community website postings and social media. A&L aspires to keep events free of charge for students and children under age 12. If necessary to supplement the cost of the event, faculty, staff and community members are charged a nominal fee of no more than \$15.

Since its inception, this series has become an integral part of campus life and offers eye-opening perspectives on multiple topics, issues, and disciplines by bringing in exceptional guests who are experts in various fields creatively and intellectually. Reaching over 4000 people each year, the program not only supplements and complements curricular needs but it also enriches cultural life on the campus and within the community.

The 2017 Arts & Lectures Signature event will be a lecture by Dr. Alfredo Quinones-Hinojosa entitled: Becoming Dr. Q: My Journey from Migrant Farm Worker to Brain Surgeon. Dr. Quinones-Hinojosa is a world renowned neurosurgeon and neuroscientist who leads cutting-edge research to cure brain cancer. From his impoverished childhood in the tiny village of Palaco, Mexico, to his harrowing border crossing and his transformation from illegal immigrant to American citizen and gifted student at the University of California at Berkeley and at Harvard Medical School, Dr. Q's life is a testament to persistence, hard work, the power of hope and imagination, and the pursuit of excellence. March 2017 will mark the 20th anniversary of the statue installation and naming of Cesar Chavez Plaza at CSUSM. This Arts & Lectures signature event will cap a week-long celebration to include presentations from artists, Chávez family members, long-time United Farm Workers organizers; documentary and film discussion; panel discussions on immigration, the Dream Act, and migrant labor conditions; cultural events for the campus and surrounding community.

Arts & Lectures goals are to inspire, motivate, and support learning for students and the community. It brings the community onto campus to engage in artistic, cultural and scholarly activities, discussions, and debates and provides access and promotion to San Marcos for events that might not otherwise have been offered to the region.

The Arts & Lectures Advisory Committee is composed of faculty, staff, and students from across the community. Its primary mission is to promote and enable a fair and equitable proposal process that ensures an exceptional annual series filled with culturally diverse events presented by professionals and experts in their respective fields. A&L events support CSUSM's mission by contributing to the strategic priorities of academic excellence, student life, campus climate, community partnerships, and educational equity. As CSUSM continues to grow, the committee also provides recommendations to the administration for the sustained development of the Arts & Lectures program that upholds the values of CSUSM.

Arts & Lectures continues to bring recognition and be supported by San Marcos's award-winning community. In April of 2015 Arts & Lectures featured *Transnational Labor: A Struggle Within the Struggle* presented by Dolores Huerta. Dolores Huerta is one of the most influential civil rights and labor activists in the U.S. She cofounded the United Farm Workers with Cesar Chavez advocating for farm workers in this country. This event was partially funded by Palomar College and received local television coverage by KUSI-TV.

In fall of 2015 Arts & Lectures featured two events curated solely by the local community. *Time Capsule of Music* presented by Howard Anton Duncan, a San Marcos native, and his company performed swing, ballads, blues and early rock and roll on a musical journey through the decades within the historical context of events from the Great Depression era, FRD's "New Deal" legislation and the atomic bomb to times of economic prosperity in the postwar U.S. This event was attended by over 200 San Marcos community members and featured in the September edition of SHARE San Marcos.

Beginning in 2017-2018 Arts & Lectures at CSU San Marcos will seek to be self-sustaining. Sponsorships, community support, and ticket sales are critical to the continued success of Arts & Lectures. There is a comprehensive list of sponsorship packages on the A&L website. Previous sponsors include ViaSat, CSUSM Extended Learning, and Stone Brewery. A&L encourages co-sponsorships among campus entities, as well as leveraging existing and new partnerships with community organizations. The program will continue to seek outside support for this longstanding culturally enriching program. Support from the San Marcos Community Foundation can help Arts & Lectures continue to fulfill the role as a leader in arts and educational outreach for the City of San Marcos.

This is in part due to having two of the five locations in San Marcos, but also to the fact that the City has dedicated several mobile home parks to seniors only. North County Senior Connections is a natural partner with the City of San Marcos to provide for a population that is vulnerable economically but that has contributed so much as a generation to the well-being of the community as a whole. Grant Proposal to San Marcos Community Foundation

1. Grant Purpose

To meet the needs of North County San Diego's growing senior population, the Rancho Santa Fe Foundation seeks general operating support for North County Senior Connections (NCSC), a weekly lunch and socialization program for underserved North County seniors served via the food truck, *Thyme Together*. NCSC locations are strategically located throughout Vista, San Marcos, and Oceanside at four senior mobile home communities and one faith center, five days a week. Two of these sites are in San Marcos (Palomar Estates East and West), housing 1327 residents. In addition to healthy, prepared to order meals, weekly educational speakers and entertainment are presented. North County Senior Connections is a collaborative program of the Rancho Santa Fe Foundation (RSFF), Interfaith Community Services (ICS), Dreams for Change (DfC), and Jacobs Cushman San Diego Food Bank (SDFB).

2. Grant Period

Present – December 2016

3. Request Amount

Total amount requested is \$10,000

4. Background and Needs Statement

Based on a needs assessment conducted by the University of San Diego, the core of the NCSC Program is based on the premise that good nutrition is the path to senior physical and mental wellness. A well-nourished senior is more likely to stay healthy and function independently and thus be able to engage with others. They want to experience social connectedness and have a sense of belonging. Therefore, NCSC revolves around a "food-friends-health" model. As transportation is the greatest issue affecting seniors' access to programs and services, NCSC takes the food truck and the program to where seniors live and congregate.

During the six month pilot phase from November 2014 to April 2015, North County Senior Connections served 2,416 meals at four locations to 313 unduplicated seniors. The program continues to grow, with requests for NCSC to serve additional sites around North County. Between May 1, 2015 and May 31, 2016, a total of 8,893 meals have been served to 953 unduplicated seniors.

5. Project Summary

Recognizing that for many seniors, transportation and access to services is a challenge, the Rancho Santa Fe Foundation developed this innovative, collaboration that takes the meals and access to services to where seniors live and congregate. Funding for this program will support North County Senior Connections' efforts to promote healthy aging in place and self-sufficiency through wholesome nutrition, social connectedness, community engagement, and lifelong learning. Locally sourced, healthy, cooked-to-order meals are prepared on the *Thyme Together* food truck at five locations each week. The locations are strategically located throughout Vista, San Marcos and Oceanside to effectively address the nutritional needs of vulnerable seniors, while also expanding socialization opportunities, providing educational speakers, entertainment, and information on health resources and supportive services.

6. Goals and Outcomes

The North County Senior Connections program will continue to provide access to healthy food while enhancing social connectedness for vulnerable seniors in North County.

The goals of the NCSC program through December 2017 are:

- To serve 15,500 meals to 750 additional unduplicated seniors
- To create a fresh produce delivery system from local resources at each site. NOTE: As of December 2015, Jacobs & Cushman San Diego Food Bank began supplying fresh produce for seniors attending the lunches.

The anticipated outcomes are:

- 70% of NCSC participants, at the conclusion of each 6 month period, will report that meals and resources provided by the NCSC have improved their nutritional security
- 70% of NCSC participants, at the conclusion of each six month period, will report that socialization, and access to supportive services through NCSC have improved their quality of life
- Fresh produce will be available to seniors at each location at least twice a month

7. Evaluation

The University of San Diego (USD) has been engaged by RSFF to measure outcomes and impact, and will conduct independent evaluations of the program. Evaluation will consist of qualitative and quantitative data, including attendance, the number of meals served, focus groups, survey responses from seniors, and questionnaires measuring social connections, physical and mental wellness, and quality of life. Interfaith Community Services and Dreams for Change will work closely with USD to implement data collection, daily activity journals and support data.

8. Timeline – May 2015 – December 2017

9. Risks

Developing a collaborative program is challenging and can be risky. The Rancho Santa Fe Foundation, as the backbone partner, has put in place monthly conference calls and quarterly team meetings, with troubleshooting as needed. Open lines of communication help to avoid problems by addressing challenges as a team.

An ongoing task is increasing and maintaining attendance at each site—ICS works with management at each site to develop incentives to attend. Developing a reliable volunteer corps that is well trained and managed has been challenging. ICS is refining its training and scheduling of volunteers to increase efficiency at all sites.

In order to ensure effectiveness, efficiency and sustainability, ICS and DfC must begin to build their own capacity to sustain NCSC when RSFF's funding ends in 2017. To that end, RSFF is encouraging both organizations to begin building relationships with potential funders now.

10. Sustainability

RSFF has committed its Community Impact Fund 2013 through 2016 to this project, however additional funding is needed to expand and sustain North County Senior Connections. We received a significant two year grant from Leichtag Foundation in the amount of \$100,000. More than \$70,000 has been contributed by individual donors. 100% of the Board of Directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Foundation has participated in funding NCSC. RSFF is in conversation with other potential funders including The San Diego Foundation, more than 30 North County based private foundations, donor advised fund holders at the Rancho Santa Fe Foundation and individual donors in the community. RSFF focused its 2015 #GivingTuesday efforts on North County Senior Connections, raising \$18,600. See attached Budget Worksheet for Committed and Pending funding sources.

RSFF will continue working with Interfaith Community Services and Dreams for Change to raise the funds needed to sustain the program. Government funding through the County of San Diego as well as with the individual municipalities in which NCSC is operating will be one area of concentration. Through actively soliciting these additional funding opportunities, ICS and DfC will ensure their capacity to sustain North County Senior Connections. Dreams for Change plans to build sustainability for North County Senior Connections by incorporating both social enterprise and workforce development, to support and expand the food service while also reducing the financial resources needed to operate the food truck.



CASE FOR SUPPORT **North County Senior Connections (NCSC)**

Increasing wellness and food security for vulnerable seniors in North San Diego County

While it is remarkable that an increasing number of seniors are living longer and healthier lives, this increased age expectancy challenges our community to provide the vital social connections and nutritional services necessary to support the growing number of seniors aging in their homes.

The San Diego Association of Governments (2013) estimates that by 2030, the population of older adults in San Diego County aged 65+ will increase by 130 percent and those 75+ will increase by 111 percent. The Center on Policy Initiatives (2015) published a report that found, in San Diego County, more than 47,000 seniors are living below the federal poverty level of \$12,316 per year.

To respond to these challenges, the RSF Foundation Grants & Projects Committee sought to fund a collaborative program that would support vulnerable seniors in North San Diego County. The committee commissioned a needs assessment to better understand the food and transportation needs of this vulnerable senior population. This study, conducted by the Caster Family Center for Nonprofit and Philanthropic Research at the University of San Diego, found that the seniors benefit most from a program that combines food and social time and that a lack of public transportation is a key issue in the North County region.

Using recommendations from Caster Center study, RSF Foundation created North County Senior Connections (NCSC) – with a vision of healthy aging and increased food security for vulnerable seniors in North County San Diego. We put that vision into action by providing access to senior services and socialization with fresh and nutritious meals provided by a food truck.

The core of North County Senior Connections is based on the premise that good nutrition is the path to senior physical and mental wellness. The food truck, named *Thyme Together*, effectively provides a mobile senior center. Since North County covers a large area geographically, and public transportation is inadequate, NCSC takes the senior center to the seniors.



The food truck serves freshly prepared lunches to seniors at four mobile home parks and one faith center, Monday through Friday each week (except holidays). Seniors make their selection from a full menu of nutritious options, and they pay \$2.00 for the meal. The North County Senior Connections program also promotes social time for the seniors with activities that inform and entertain them. Volunteers are recruited and trained to take meal orders from seniors, serve food from the truck to seniors' tables, and provide friendly visits and conversations throughout the meals.

Since May 2015, North County Senior Connections served **8,893** meals to **953** unduplicated vulnerable North County seniors. Eighty-seven percent of participants reported improved nutritional security and improved quality of life.

North County Senior Connections (NCSC) is a collaborative program between a funder, the Rancho Santa Fe Foundation, and three nonprofit organizations, Dreams for Change, Interfaith Community Services and Produce Good.

The role of Dreams for Change was first to purchase the food truck and prepare it for the program, from upgrading the interior to wrapping the exterior with the new *Thyme Together* graphics. Dreams for Change also handles all the senior nutrition research, menu development, and food buying and preparation.



Interfaith Community Services provides the program manager to arrange for the educational and recreational programs at the lunch sites and an on-site coordinator. They also refer and connect seniors to information and additional support services they may need.



Produce Good recruits, trains, schedules and manages the volunteer corps—an essential component of NCSC.

The Rancho Santa Fe Foundation, as a funder, provides a multi-year grant to fund the food truck, staff and subsidies for the meals. The Foundation continues to seek collaborative support for the program from other foundations, businesses and individuals to fully fund the program over three years.

This innovative collaboration in North County San Diego is known for both its nutritious food and its charitable mission. That mission is to provide nutritious meals and socialization to support healthy aging for vulnerable seniors in Vista, Oceanside and San Marcos.

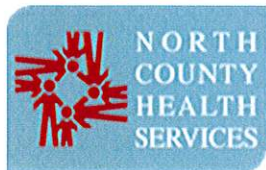

ORGANIZATION INFORMATION:

North County Health Project, Inc., aka North County Health Services (NCHS) is a 501(c)(3) federally qualified health center that began as an all volunteer organization in 1971. NCHS' **mission** is *"to improve the health status of our diverse communities by providing quality healthcare that is comprehensive, affordable, and culturally sensitive."*

Based in San Marcos, NCHS has served San Marcos residents since 1976. NCHS' two San Marcos locations served 32,828 patients (117,855 visits) in 2015. Ninety-eight percent (98%) of patients who reported incomes were at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (74% were below 100% FPL). Patients identified themselves as 71% Hispanic, 22% White, 3% Asian, 2% African American, and 2% other or mixed race; 40% of patients were children aged 19 and under. Patients are not turned away due to their level of ability to pay for services.

NCHS' comprehensive services include adult and pediatric primary care, internal medicine, obstetrics, gynecology, perinatology, family planning, dentistry, behavioral health, chiropractic services, radiology, lab, pharmacy, and enabling services, such as transportation and language interpretation. NCHS also conducts extensive outreach and assists eligible families in applying for, enrolling in, and utilizing their health insurance/MediCal/CalFresh/WIC benefits.

In addition to clinical services, NCHS has a wide range of programs in North County that focus on early prevention to maximize health outcomes. NCHS' WIC (Women, Infants and Children supplemental nutrition program) serves almost 11,000 women and children monthly. NCHS conducts extensive outreach, community health fairs, and free health screenings (dental, blood pressure, glucose, obesity, etc.). These screenings include helping individuals and families establish a dental/medical home at NCHS. NCHS' Family Nutrition Program provides nutrition education and training for families with young children to form good nutritional habits from an early age. NCHS also conducts support groups for patients with chronic conditions like hypertension, diabetes and obesity, and also for mental health. Federal and state programs include medical and dental services for homeless individuals and teen pregnancy prevention.

NCHS' primary care health centers hold the National Committee for Quality Assurance's Patient-Centered Medical Home (PCMH) level 3 recognition. This distinction recognizes long-term patient relationships, and continued improvements to quality and efficiency of care.

PROJECT: ECG Machine for NCHS San Marcos Health Center

North County Health Services respectfully requests a \$4,700 grant from the San Marcos Community Foundation to purchase a new Electrocardiograph (ECG) machine for NCHS San Marcos Health Center (also called an EKG). NCHS will cover the cost of sales tax, training and calibration in-kind. NCHS will purchase a new compact, wireless ECG machine (McKesson LUMEON® and Burdick Premium Resting ECG). It will interface with NCHS' Electronic Health Records so that precise data from up to 12 sensors (electrode leads) can automatically be recorded into each patient's health record, saving time and eliminating errors.



Proposal to San Marcos Community Foundation

We're here for you.

An electrocardiogram (ECG) is used to detect abnormal heart rhythms (palpitations) and to investigate the cause of chest pains. The heart produces tiny electrical impulses which spread through the heart muscle to make the heart contract. These impulses can be detected by the ECG machine, which may also be used as part of routine tests, such as before having an operation.

To perform the test, a doctor places small electrodes on the patient's arms, legs and chest. The ECG detects and amplifies the electrical impulses from each of the electrodes that occur at each heartbeat and records them on a line on a paper or computer screen. The doctor reads and interprets the peaks and dips of the line to diagnose abnormal or unusual activity.

One of the most common uses for an ECG is for patients with high blood pressure to detect any damage to the heart or blood vessels, cholesterol clogging up the heart's blood supply, a past heart attack, enlargement of one side of the heart, or abnormal heart rhythms.

PROJECT BENEFITS:

A San Marcos Community Foundation grant will ensure that NCHS patients needing ECG tests will have immediate access to these preventive, diagnostic tests. The new computer-based ECG machine will be used on a daily basis, serving at least 600 patients per year. The high-resolution, color LCD monitor has a convenient touchscreen that will display up to 12 electrode leads of ECG data per patient for immediate review and chart plotting. The need to repeat an ECG test will be reduced because the system is able to select and capture the best 10 seconds of data.

The new ECG will be augmented by an existing portable ECG at NCHS San Marcos that is not computer-based and produces only paper read-outs. Due to being frequently moved, the portable ECG requires frequent recalibrations that temporarily put it out of service. Therefore NCHS will use the portable ECG as a back-up whenever the new ECG needs regular maintenance, including recalibration. This will ensure that patients will not have to schedule a separate appointment, or be referred to an outside specialist, which could be more costly.

Due to greater accessibility, doctors performing pre-op ECGs (before operations or other procedures) for patients will significantly reduce the lag time between the need for surgery and the scheduled procedure, also optimizing patient outcomes. More importantly, the ECG may provide the deciding factor in where the patient should have a procedure performed. The new ECG machine will also speed up the process of sending reports to specialists for follow-up care when needed, as well as receiving ECG readouts from outside health providers.

It is often the untreated, preventable conditions that contribute to more days lost from school or work and lead families to resort to emergency rooms when symptoms become dire. With support from the San Marcos Community Foundation, NCHS' will enhance its wide array of preventive safety net services for San Marcos' low-income residents. This diagnostic tool will provide some of the most critical data needed to prevent heart attack, stroke, or even death. NCHS cares for patients during all stages of their lives and does not turn patients away due to their level of ability to pay for services.

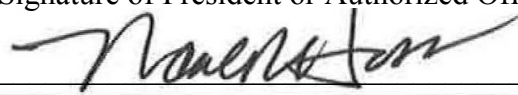

The Alliance to Accelerate Excellence in Education at CSUSM:

Roadshows and Coaching Cadres

The Alliance to Accelerate Excellence in Education at California State University San Marcos requests \$10,000 from the San Marcos Community Foundation to offer college readiness assemblies called “Roadshows” to 1500 8th grade students at all four San Marcos middle schools: San Marcos Middle School, Woodland Park Middle School, San Elijo Middle School and Double Peak School; and to further support college readiness by recruiting and training a Coaching Cadre of current CSUSM students to support 1400 graduating San Marcos seniors from San Marcos High School and Mission Hills High School over the summer as they prepare for the transition from high school to college.

The Alliance to Accelerate Excellence in Education is the umbrella administrative office for the CSUSM guaranteed admission program. This program is detailed in MOU with 10 local school districts and is part of the university’s goal of raising the educational attainment of the region. The Alliance is the first of its kind and works to support the success of the whole student - academically, emotionally, and socially - from K-12 education to college, and it is built upon the premise that all stakeholders: school districts, the university, and community organizations, can work together to make a difference for all youth.

CSUSM leadership is deeply and publicly dedicated to making student success a top institution-wide priority. We know that education is a passport to social and economic prosperity for our students and our region. The university is proud of its diverse student body: 50% of students are first in their family to attend college and approximately 60% of students self-identify as students of color.

Our commitment to student success is what led President Karen Haynes to sign the University’s first guaranteed admission agreement with San Marcos Unified School District in 2006. Today, the Alliance oversees then such agreements with school districts in Oceanside, Vista, San Marcos, Escondido, Valley Center/Pauma, Fallbrook, Carlsbad, Temecula, Lake Elsinore and Murrieta. Through these ten districts, the Alliance serves 177,770 students. With a vision statement that focuses on students getting *to* college and then successfully *through* college, the Alliance works collaboratively to meet the unique needs of each district’s students. The funding requested here will serve two purposes:

First, it will allow the Alliance to build upon a successful 2015-2016 pilot project in which CSUSM students designed and delivered college readiness assemblies for local 8th grade students. In the assemblies, college students introduced the guaranteed admission agreement and reminded participants about what it takes to be accepted to college. Because the Roadshows were presented by real college students, the 8th grade students were very receptive. After each of the four pilot assemblies, students lingered afterwards to talk with the CSUSM facilitators, to ask questions, and to make connections. The CSUSM students, in collaboration with Alliance staff, refined the roadshows based upon student and teacher feedback and will be offering them to all middle schools in the Alliance (40 in total).

Funding from the San Marcos Community Foundation will be used only in the four San Marcos middle schools and will allow us to enhance the experience with an additional facilitator and with prizes and printed information not available to the other 36 middle schools. The prizes are lanyards with the CSUSM Alliance logo that students can use to hold school identification

cards, house keys, and other frequently used items. Although these lanyards were extremely popular in the pilot roadshows during the 2015-2016 academic year, budget limitations mean we are unable to offer them to 8th graders in all districts. This grant would provide these items to San Marcos students, which serves as a reminder of the Alliance and its guaranteed admission agreement. Additionally, we would like to distribute MOU checklists in an easy-to-read format that students can keep in their binders and backpacks. Funding would allow us to offer this resource to San Marcos students when it is unavailable to other students across the Alliance.

Second, it will allow the Alliance to design and pilot a support network for graduating high school seniors known as Coaching Cadres. Because San Marcos schools serve a large number of low-income, under-represented students who are first in their families to attend college, the Alliance would like to provide additional summer support to ensure that high school graduates who are admitted to and enroll at CSUSM successfully transition over the summer and arrive at the university as planned. Without a dedicated person to answer questions and give support, many would-be first generation college students flounder after high school graduation.

The Alliance's Coaching Cadres will be modeled after a successful program in New York City. This program, run by College Access: Research & Action (CARA), trains current college students to work as mentors to graduating high school seniors to help them figure out how to pay for textbooks, register for their university's orientation program, fill out financial aid and other forms, and address the myriad questions that arise in the summer before one's first semester at college. Although the New York City program is in its infancy, anecdotal reports indicate that it is helping more high school graduates make the leap from high school to college.

Coaches would be current CSUSM students who work 15 hours per week for eight weeks in the summer and are assigned a caseload of 25-50 graduates from San Marcos High School or Mission Hills High School. Identified in collaboration with counselors at the two high schools, these recent graduates would receive weekly contact from the coaches as well as be able to attend regular office hours and to ask questions as they transition from high school to college. Coaches would be recruited during the 2016-2017 academic year, trained in Spring 2017, and work throughout Summer 2017. At the end of the summer, we will review enrollment data, solicit feedback from both coaches and students, and make adjustments to this pilot program with the intention of expanding it to all Alliance districts.

Funding from the San Marcos Community Foundation would support four current CSUSM students to act as the pilot Coaching Cadre and would benefit students from both San Marcos and Mission Hills high schools. Only students from these two high schools will be assigned to the Coaching Cadre's initial caseload so the direct benefit will be to members of the City of San Marcos.

Data indicate students admitted through the Alliance enter CSUSM with higher high school GPAs, and higher SAT/ACT scores than the general student population. Alliance students at CSUSM also have higher college GPAs, take more units per semester, and have a higher four- and five-year graduation rate than the general student population. We also know the majority of Alliance students are first generation college students. As the Alliance initiatives launch and develop, we expect to see similar results across all districts and with a growing number of students.

This funding from the San Marcos Community Foundation will provide an additional benefit for the City of San Marcos, allowing San Marcos Unified School District to act as the trailblazer on this very important project and then serve as a guide and resource in the future.

They were also told about a website called strongnonprofit.org which provides information on how a nonprofit can self evaluate their fiscal status.
- San Marcos needs assessment meeting with 19 local agencies
PRESIDENT LUKOFF attended the meeting sponsored by the City of San Marcos to identify what the current needs are in the community and to learn about resources that are available. The top issue discussed at the meeting was housing. The guest speaker was 211 San Diego and they shared the different resources that are available to the public. She felt a sense of pride because most of the agencies that were in attendance, the foundation has given grants to.
- 211 Quarterly Update
PRESIDENT LUKOFF stated that the City of San Marcos receives a quarterly report from 211 San Diego. If there is any specific information the Board would like to see, it can be

requested. The report for January 2016 to March 2016 indicates 685 calls were from San Marcos clients and over 1,100 referrals were made.

2. FUND STATEMENT AND ACTIVITY REPORT

BOARD SECRETARY GORDON reviewed the fund statement and activity report. The balance as of March 31, 2016 was \$1.13 million. It bounced back a little since the big drop in January. It is about \$100,000 less than at the beginning of the fiscal year but there has been grantmaking.

BOARD MEMBER CONFREY reported that he attended a recent Jewish Community Foundation meeting. He expected some very conservative investments but they are not. They are trying to make the maximum return for their clients.

3. ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING

BOARD PRESIDENT LUKOFF reported that a quorum was not present to hold the meeting. They took advantage of the time to talk about ways of informing the public about the foundation and encouraging the public to join the Now and Forever Campaign.

BOARD MEMBER MONAHAN recommends participating in 3 to 4 community events over the next year with a budget of \$400 to \$500 for a banner and limited printed materials. She also recommends borrowing an ipad to show images of some of the grants they have provided and to ask the City to waive any fees for booth or space needs.

4. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

BOARD MEMBER MONAHAN MOTIONED TO APPROVE COLLEEN LUKOFF AS BOARD PRESIDENT AND TERI WILLIAMS AS BOARD VICE PRESIDENT. BOARD MEMBER WASCO SECONDED. THE MOTION PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

5. REAPPOINTMENT OF CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER AND BOARD SECRETARY

BOARD VICE PRESIDENT WILLIAMS MOTIONED TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2016-06. THE MOTION PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

6. SMCF GRANT FUNDING COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

BOARD PRESIDENT LUKOFF stated they received funding requests from five institutions and are recommending funding three. BOARD MEMBER CONFREY reported on his visit to Fraternity House. He stated they are in dire need of funding and recommends full funding. BOARD PRESIDENT LUKOFF stated that given the other needs they are recommending a lesser amount to Palomar College for their Bridge to Success Program. The Boys and Girls

Club is asking for \$5,000 for their civic engagement program and indicated they would accept this as a challenge grant. She spoke with their Executive Director and was told the program ends in June 2017. The grant funding committee recommends awarding half of the amount now and the other half at the end of the program year.

BOARD MEMBER MONAHAN MOTIONED TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2016-07 – APPROVING FUNDING FOR FRATERNITY HOUSE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$5,281.97, PALOMAR COLLEGE FOUNDATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,150, AND BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB OF SAN MARCOS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$5,000. BOARD MEMBER NUTTAL SECONDED. THE MOTION PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

BOARD MEMBER MONAHAN stated that she contacted CSUSM Foundation regarding their funding request. Their budget is for the entire arts and lecture series and they are asking for funding one lecture series which will be their signature event. Board member Wasco stated that he supports the arts and lecture series however he questioned how these will benefit San Marcos residents and stated that the application does not state how many residents will benefit.

BOARD MEMBER NUTTALL MOTIONED TO APPROVE FUNDING FOR ART ANIMATES LIFE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,000 AND FOR CAL STATE UNIVERSITY SAN MARCOS FOUNDATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$2,500. BOARD MEMBER MONAHAN SECONDED. THE MOTION PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

CONSENT CALENDAR

BOARD VICE PRESIDENT WILLIAMS MOTIONED TO APPROVE THE CONSENT CALENDAR. BOARD MEMBER WASCO SECONDED. THE MOTION PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

8. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES** SMCF Board Meeting February 16, 2016 – Approved
9. **ORAL COMMUNICATIONS** – SYLVIA PASUDO, San Marcos resident and real estate owner spoke about difficulties she is having with a building permit. She was informed that this board does not address those issues and she was directed to contact the city's building division.
