




In Quarter 1 2018 (Jul - Sep 2018), 2-1-1 San Diego helped **378** clients with income below 80% AMI who resided in San Marcos (zip codes: 92069, 92078, 92079, 92096). These clients presented **1,444** needs, which resulted in **1,010** referrals to services to address these needs.



359 clients have created an identifiable client record (95% of clients served). Of these, **275** consented to share their information in the Community Information Exchange (CIE) (76% of identifiable clients). **378** clients reported income below 80% of the Area Medium Income (AMI) for San Diego County or received referrals indicating they were low income, with **75%** reporting AMI of 30% or less.



Gender Identity




Race/Ethnicity



73% of clients who called from San Marcos are **women**, which is about the same as the total population of 2-1-1 clients (71%). About half (**53%**) of the clients from San Marcos are **Hispanic or Latino**, which is higher than the total population of 2-1-1 clients (42%). Additionally, only **6%** of the San Marcos clients are **Black/African American**, which is much lower than the total population of 2-1-1 clients (15%).

Age Group




Clients from San Marcos represent roughly the same age groups as the total population of 2-1-1 clients. This quarter, there was a comparatively smaller percentage of clients in the **20-29** age ranges (**15%**) and a larger percentage of clients in the **40-49** (**21%**) and **70-79** (**7%**) age ranges than the general 2-1-1 population.

Client Needs


Client needs are organized by a taxonomy structure. Taxonomy is a thorough classification system that distinguishes concepts, names those concepts, and puts those concepts into a hierarchical order. The first level is the most broad level, with up to six nested layers that progressively increase in specificity. 2-1-1 Customer Service Representatives document client needs using this structured system.

Needs by Taxonomy: Clients living in City of San Marcos




Basic Needs account for 57% of total needs for clients in the City of San Marcos this quarter. **Income Support and Employment**, **Organizational/Community/International Services**, and **Criminal Justice and Legal Services** account for an additional 25%. Below is a more detailed description of needs by category (second level needs). The most common basic needs are **Utilities** (26%), **Housing/Shelter** (20%), and **Food** (9%).


