5) **PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS**

Dr. Eloise Stiglitz, CSUSM VP of Student Affairs was in attendance and introduced.

6) **PRESENTATIONS**

Start Smart Program Overview: Sgt. Cinnamo provided a presentation on Start Smart and explained that the San Diego County Sheriff's Department has been tasked to address the issue of teen drinking and distracted driving to prevent injury or death as a result of poor choices or illegal actions while operating a motor vehicle. The Sheriff's Department will be providing a presentation at Mission Hills High School on 9/15/10 at 6:30 PM. The Start Smart program will be mandatory at both high school campuses beginning second semester to obtain a parking permit.

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7) REPORTS

Sheriff's Department Report: Sgt. Giannantonio was promoted to Lieutenant and will be leaving the San Marcos Sheriff's Station. His replacement, Sgt. Mark Moreno, attended the meeting and was introduced. Lt. Giannantonio provided statistics for the last 2 months and reported that noise and party calls are up slightly compared to the same reporting timeframe last year.

Commissioner Martinez requested Sgt. Cinnamo provide an update on how the Start Smart classes went to the Commission after the first semester.

Rooming House Report: Director Schwarm provided a report of rooming house complaints for the past four years. Rooming house ordinance complaints are up and an arrest was made a couple of weeks ago at a former rooming house/party house complainant's residence. Deputies had been called to the house 17 times in the past 12 months after a citation had been written for noise to the tenants. Property owner has been contacted and cited.

Commissioner Hill asked the following questions: 1) that the call was a noise related call and not a rooming house call? 2) was the residence inspected? 3) did the fine relate to a rooming house violation or a noise violation? Director Schwarm clarified the following regarding Commissioner Hill's questions: 1) the complaint call was related to both rooming house and noise violations and the property owner stated there were five people living at the residence; 2) a follow up inspection was conducted by Code Compliance; 3) two citations were given for a total of \$100 – one for noise and one for exceeding the number of people residing at the home per the rooming house ordinance.

Romero confirmed the rooming house ordinance complaints will be reviewed annually in July. Romero explained that if a complaint is made for a potential rooming house ordinance violation and other complaints are also made associated with noise and/or trash, code compliance will investigate and a violation notice issued accordingly which allows time for the violation to be corrected prior to a citation /fine being issued.

8) COMMISSION COMMENTARY

Commissioner Hill commented that her position remains that the rooming house ordinance, as written, is not needed.

Commissioner Figuero reported that they are in the 3rd week of school at CSUSM. CSUSM continues with TSSA to register 10% of their population at CSUSM, including the community who are not students. Homecoming is scheduled the week of October 18th.

Commissioner Titus introduced Commissioner Cassandra Padilla and announced the grand opening was held for Palomar's new health sciences building.

Commissioner Padilla reported she has been at Palomar for 3 years and is pursuing a political science major.

Commissioner Martinez reported that President Haynes's University Council met September 9th. There were 9,582 students on campus opening day; the vision for 2015 was discuss as well as budget uncertainties and the impacts to the campus. It was mentioned that out of the 9,000+ students at CSUSM, 900 students are veterans (active duty or

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dependents). The CSUSM Gala raised \$50,000 for scholarships. President Haynes was congratulated for being nominated for one of San Diego magazines 2010 Women Who Move The City finalists – the winner will be announced September 15th. CSUSM President's Annual Report to the Community is scheduled for Feb 3rd, 2011 and Commissioner Martinez invited Commissioners to join him at his table for the event.

Romero explained she hopes to get with the City Attorney to review the 14 page draft Entertainment Ordinance and present it to the Commission at the October meeting for consideration.

Chair Quinn reported the University Convocation was held on August 26th at the Escondido Center for the Arts and highlights included: retention of first time freshman increased by 4% and remediation rates in English and math increased by 5%. CSUSM has been designated a Hispanic serving institution and awarded its first HIS grant of \$250,000 for a project through the department of biology. The HSI designation benefits all students. The campus was named the winner of San Diego Excellence in Energy award for a comprehensive energy conservation project. Cal State's current recycling rate is 72% which they were acknowledged as nationwide recycle-mania champions for several years running. CSUSM has been designated by GI Jobs Magazine on its list of military friendly schools which honors the top 15% of colleges, universities and trade schools across the country doing the most to embrace American veterans as students.

Romero responded to Commissioner Martinez's inquiry relating to the status of student housing and reported the developer is moving forward and plans to break ground later this year to be in line for the 2012 school year.

Romero responded to Commissioner Hill's inquiry of what if the student housing development is started and is unable to proceed because it is unaffordable by stating that the development is private with a private developer and one cannot pontificate or surmise what will happen on an eventuality that may or may not happen. Commissioner Hill stated she realizes it is speculation but one in a city position does need to speculate to some degree to avoid problems or if one finds one's self in them to have a plan already in place.

4) **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

The minutes of the September 13th, 2010 meeting were not approved and continued to the next regular scheduled meeting due to lack of a quorum.

5) **ORAL COMMUNICATIONS**

No members of the public requested to speak.

6) **PRESENTATIONS**

Chair Quinn announced the resignation of Commissioner Hill and a proclamation in recognition of her service was read into the record as Commissioner Hill was not present.

Dan Weinheimer, city staff, provided a presentation and overview of San Marcos Saturday's program. WEINHEIMER responded to INDIVIDUAL COMMISSIONER questions as follows: 1) the first San Marcos Saturday event will be held on January 22, 2011; 2) seniors are defined as 65 years and older; 3) disabled persons will be determined on a case-by-case basis by staff who will meet with the individual(s) and evaluate; 4) fencing replacement/repair will not be included in the program in the beginning but could be considered in the future with community donations; 5) some equipment from the VIBE can be used for the San Marcos Saturdays program and volunteers will be asked to bring equipment they have also; and, 6) city staff will assess property and equipment needs and provide a list of materials needed online.

7) **REPORTS**

Sheriff's Department Report: Sgt. Moreno was not present as he was working at the Holiday Watch program. Director Schwarm provided the Sheriff's Department report which showed a decrease in total noise calls, party calls and party related fight calls.

Code Compliance Report: Direct Schwarm reported that not many rooming house complaints are being received and that residents/tenants have become wise and are not inviting officers to enter the premises during other complaint call inquiries/investigations.

8) NEW BUSINESS

Chair Quinn reported she will not be in town for the January meeting and requested Commissioner Kildoo chair the January meeting. Commissioners in attendance concurred and Deputy City Manager Romero will poll the absent Commissioners for concurrence.

9) COMMISSION COMMENTARY

Commissioner Figueroa reported finals are taking place at CSUSM. President Haynes approved the proposal to extend library hours during finals. Tuition increases are planned for both the spring and fall semesters.

Commissioner Titus reported Palomar also have finals occurring. Construction continues on campus with newer buildings more specific to areas of study. The Foundation Gala fundraiser recently raised \$160,000.

Chair Quinn reported that she and Deputy City Manager Romero attended the Town Gown conference in October. CSUSM one year continuation for first time freshmen retention rate increased to 77.3% which is a 3% increase from the previous year. There was also a 19% increase in African American student retention. CSUSM women's cross country team won the national title. CSUSM partnered with the Red Cross during the destruction of the Escondido bomb house and provided an evacuation site on campus. Commencement will be back 2011.

Deputy City Manager Romero reported the SNRC 2011 meeting dates were provided to the Commission at the dais. The city is hopeful student representatives at both campuses will spread the word regarding San Marcos Saturdays. Staff can provide a shorter San Marcos Saturday's presentation to student groups and/or other local organizations such as Rotary, Kiwanis, etc.

Out of the 8 rooming house complaints only 3 were founded. There were 8 out of the 12 noise complaints founded and a notice of violation issued. At this time the numbers are trending down however the number of complaints tend to increase in the spring. A detailed report including case status and repeat offenders will be provided to the Commission in July.

8) NEW BUSINESS

Romero explained a Commission Vice Chair position was not established when the Commission was created and recommended one be established. Commissioners present concurred and asked that staff provide a process and recommendation at the next meeting.

Romero recommended moving the February 14th SNRC meeting date to either February 9th; 10th, 17th, 23rd, or 24th to better accommodate Brightwood Drive residents' attendance due to the holiday. Commissioners in attendance concurred and staff will coordinate with all Commissioners to move the meeting date.

MEETING DATE: February 17, 2011

SUBJECT: Brightwood Drive

Recommendation

Staff recommends denying request to install a timed lock on the gate at the end of the Brightwood Drive cu-de-sac.

Background

In 2008, the San Marcos Unified School District cut school bussing for kindergarten through eighth graders for financial reasons. This action created traffic problems around all 11 elementary and 3 middle schools in San Marcos. Since the school district is a sovereign governmental entity, it did not have to consult the City regarding its decision.

Since the bussing has stopped, city staff has been working with some of the Brightwood Drive residents on the issue of their cul-de-sac being used as a pick-up and drop-off location by school parents. This issue has been to the Traffic and Safety Commission twice and to this Commission in 2009. Personnel from the Sheriff's department have been to the neighborhood to issue warnings or tickets. According to the residents working on this issue, they have also spoken to the elementary and middle school principals about this issue.

In November 2010, a group of residents met with city staff, including the city manager, to discuss the issues on Brightwood Drive. After listening to the residents, it was agreed that the City would take a closer look at the use of the cul-de-sac as a school pick-up and drop-off location. The proposed remedy to be considered by the City was to time lock the gate that leads to the trail that leads directly to both schools.

After some internal discussion, it was decided that the Student and Neighborhood Relations Commission would consider this issue due to the Commission's focus on airing neighborhood issues.

Discussion

At the November 2010 meeting, residents described 50-plus cars parked in the cul-de-sac, blocking residents' drive-ways and double parking. To verify these allegations, an independent survey was conducted by engineering staff on six (6) separate days during the months of December and January to measure the drop-off and pick-up activity on Brightwood Drive.

Staff analyzed the data collected during their surveys and came to the conclusion that both car and pedestrian traffic was low during the morning drop-off period. However, in the afternoon both pedestrian and vehicle traffic increased on Brightwood. On average, approximately 10 cars were parked inside the cul-de-sac on Brightwood prior to the afternoon dismissal. Shortly after the dismissal bell, a number of cars were observed driving to the cul-de-sac or parking on Brightwood. The surveys indicate that at any given time the number of cars is between 20 and 35 (when counting the previously parked cars). On two occasions, motorists were observed double parking inside the cul-de-sac as they waited for their children to arrive. At no time was blocking of residential drive-ways observed.

In contrast, the number of pedestrians observed using the trail and walking to their home and not to a car was substantial. During the afternoon surveys the lowest pedestrian activity was 36 people to a high of 95 people walking. Based on these the numbers from the survey, the majority of trail traffic using Brightwood Drive is pedestrian.

The neighbors also expressed concern about the excessive speeding on Brightwood by drivers using the cul-de-sac. A speed survey was conducted on Brightwood using the accepted methodology of setting speed per California law. The speed in residential neighborhoods is set at 25 miles per hour. During the speed survey the average speed was 20 miles per hour; median speed was 19 miles per hour and the 85th percentile speed was 23 miles per hour. One car was observed going 33 miles per hour. Based on the 85th percentile, the large majority of cars were going the legal speed limit on Brightwood Drive.

The number of vehicles and vehicle speeds documented by city staff is also echoed by observations from the Sheriff's department. These observations were made by Sheriff's personnel in uniform and driving a marked vehicle as well as those in plain clothes driving an unmarked car.

Attached to this report are the survey findings and the engineer's observations and conclusions. In addition, there are recent e-mails from Lt. Cea of the Sheriff's department discussing the safety concerns from a law enforcement perspective.

The residents also raised a concern about fire safety. They are concerned that should a medical or fire emergency occur during pick-up and drop-off times, fire and ambulance vehicles would not be able to get through the street because of the vehicles parked and double parked on the street and in the cul-de-sac. Both the fire chief and the fire marshal visited the location and determined that there are no safety issues.

Alternate location

During the November 2010 meeting with the residents, it was suggested that residents use an alternate location should the timed lock gate proposal be approved. This alternate location is the main entrance to the trail head on Questhaven Road and Baylor Drive. As discussed in the attached engineer's memo, this location is not conducive to a pick-up and drop-off location for children. Baylor Street is a very narrow street and would not accommodate any temporary parking. Questhaven Road has a large volume of cars traveling with a signed speed limit of 35 miles per hour. The road width from Brightwood Drive to Baylor is 36 feet curb to curb and is not wide enough to accommodate on street parking.

Residents' Proposal

The residents' proposal to discourage parents from using Brightwood Drive as a pick-up and drop off location is to time lock the gate that leads to the trail that connects to both school sites. The proposed hours to lock the gate would be Monday through Friday during the school year from 7:00 am to 9:00 am and 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm.

Upon review of the data collected on Brightwood Drive along with input from the Sheriff's and Fire departments, staff cannot support the request to time lock the gate. The evidence that collected supports the intended purpose of the inter-connecting trail system, which is to provide a walkable community. Staff has not been able to replicate the allegations as explained by the residents that brought this issue forward. Therefore, staff recommends the Commission deny the Brightwood neighbors' request to time lock the trail head gate.

Options

The Commission has several options to consider:

- A. Deny the request to time lock the gate on the Brightwood cul-de-sac.
- B. Recommend to the City Council the request to time lock the gate on the Brightwood cul-de-sac.
- C. Request additional information from staff and bring this issue back for further discussion.

Action

Staff recommends a motion to deny the request to time lock the gate at the Brightwood Drive cul-de-sac.

SUBJECT: Brightwood Drive – Traffic Conditions during San Elijo Elementary School Start and Dismissal Times

Mike,

I have completed my survey of the existing traffic conditions along Brightwood Drive during San Elijo's Elementary School start and dismissal times. The surveys were conducted during the first week of December 2010 and January 2011. Based on the surveys, vehicular and pedestrian traffic during the morning start period were significantly low. An average of at least 4 cars was observed to be parked inside the cul-de-sac on Brightwood Drive. However, prior to the afternoon dismissal bell, there appears to be an average of approximately 10 vehicles parked inside the cul-de-sac and several other cars parked along Brightwood Drive. Pedestrians (majority are parents from the surrounding neighborhood) were also observed walking on Brightwood Drive and accessing the trail to pickup their children at the elementary school. Soon after the dismissal bell rings, a number of vehicles were observed to be arriving at the end of the cul-de-sac between 3:10 and 3:30 PM. If parking spaces were unavailable within the cul-de-sac, the majority of drivers would turn around in an attempt to find adequate space to park on Brightwood Drive. At least two motorists were seen to be double-parked temporarily inside the cul-de-sac, while seated in their vehicles, until their children had arrived and boarded onto their vehicles. No motorists were observed blocking resident driveways while double-parked in the cul-de-sac. Excessive speeding was not a concern on Brightwood Drive as the 85th percentile speed was measured at 23 mph for vehicles traveling towards the end of the cul-de-sac. Brightwood Drive is a local residential street with a 25 MPH speed limit per the California Vehicle Code. **It appears that the traffic conditions follow an orderly movement of traffic which last approximately 15-20 minutes after the school dismissal bell.** Parents seem to acknowledge the homeowner's request of not blocking resident driveways inside the cul-de-sac. Periodic closure of the access trail gate would inconvenience nearby residents desiring to use the public trail. Please see the attached photos and table of surveyed vehicles and pedestrians for your reference.

An alternate location where parents can access the trail to pick-up/drop-off their children to the San Elijo Elementary School is at the intersection of Baylor Drive and Questhaven Road. This location appears to be the main entrance to the existing trail. Baylor Drive is a public street west of Questhaven Road to the existing private gate and is 34 feet curb to curb. The roadway width is relatively narrow to allow through-traffic if vehicles are to be parked on both sides. This may be a problem for existing homeowners accessing their residence inside the gated community. On-street parking will need to be restricted on Baylor Drive if this alternate location is considered. Parking is restricted in both directions on Questhaven Road from San Elijo Road to Brightwood Drive. However, parking is not restricted on Questhaven Road from Brightwood Drive to Baylor Drive (directly in front of the existing neighborhood park and access trail). The street width in this segment of Questhaven Road is 36 feet curb to curb and is not recommended for on-street parking due to the

narrow roadway width and volume of cars traveling on this street. Parents likely to use this trail access will have to park their vehicles on Hollowbrook Drive (east of Questhaven Road) and cross Questhaven Road at the all-way-stop intersection on Questhaven Road and Brightwood Drive. Please let me know if you need any other additional information. Thanks.

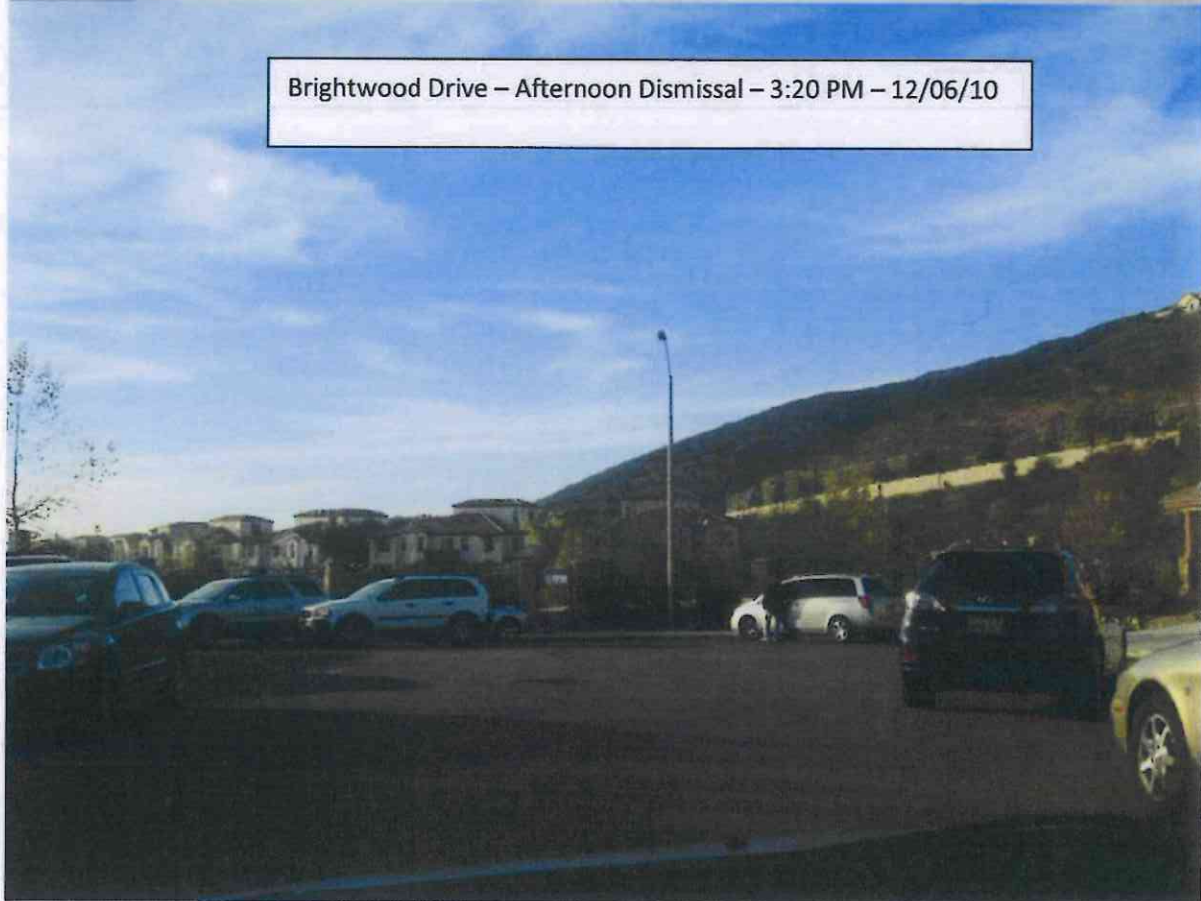

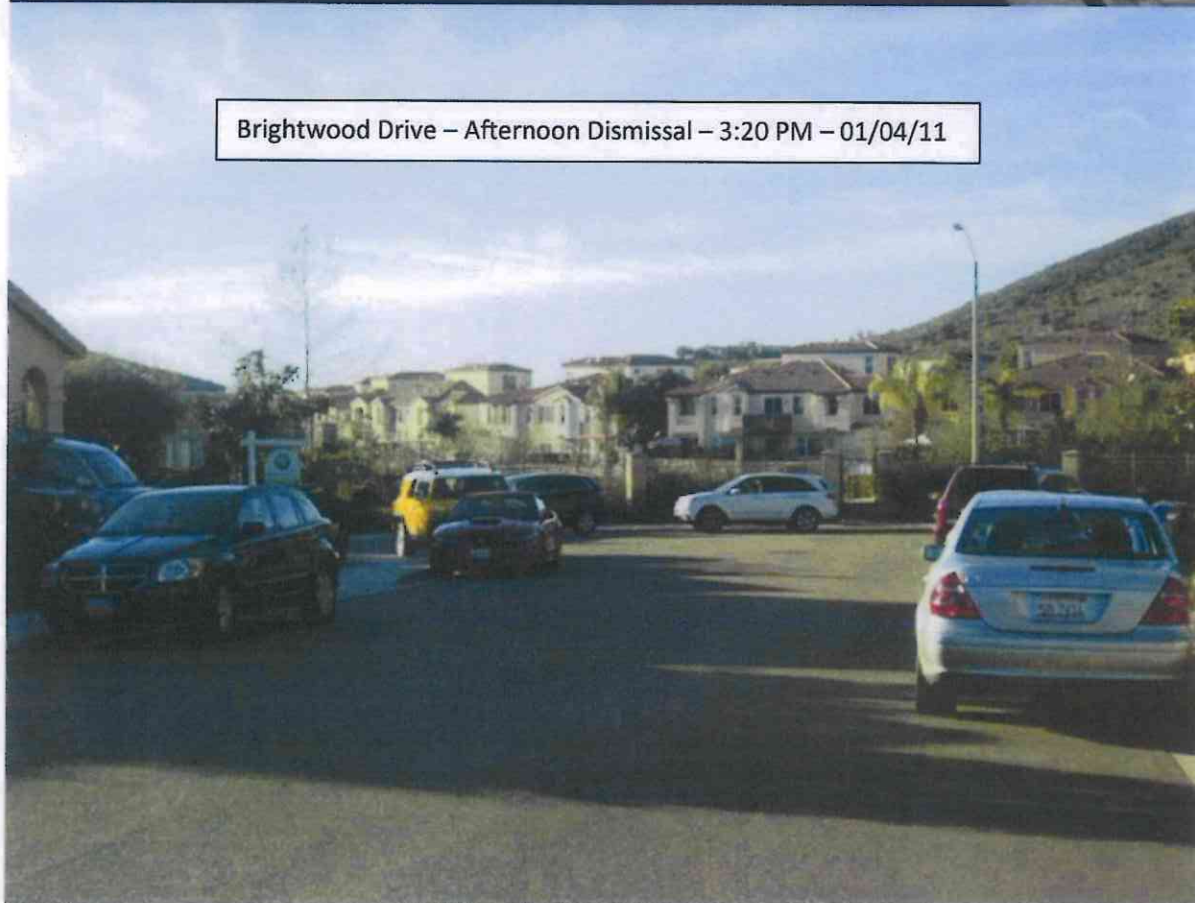

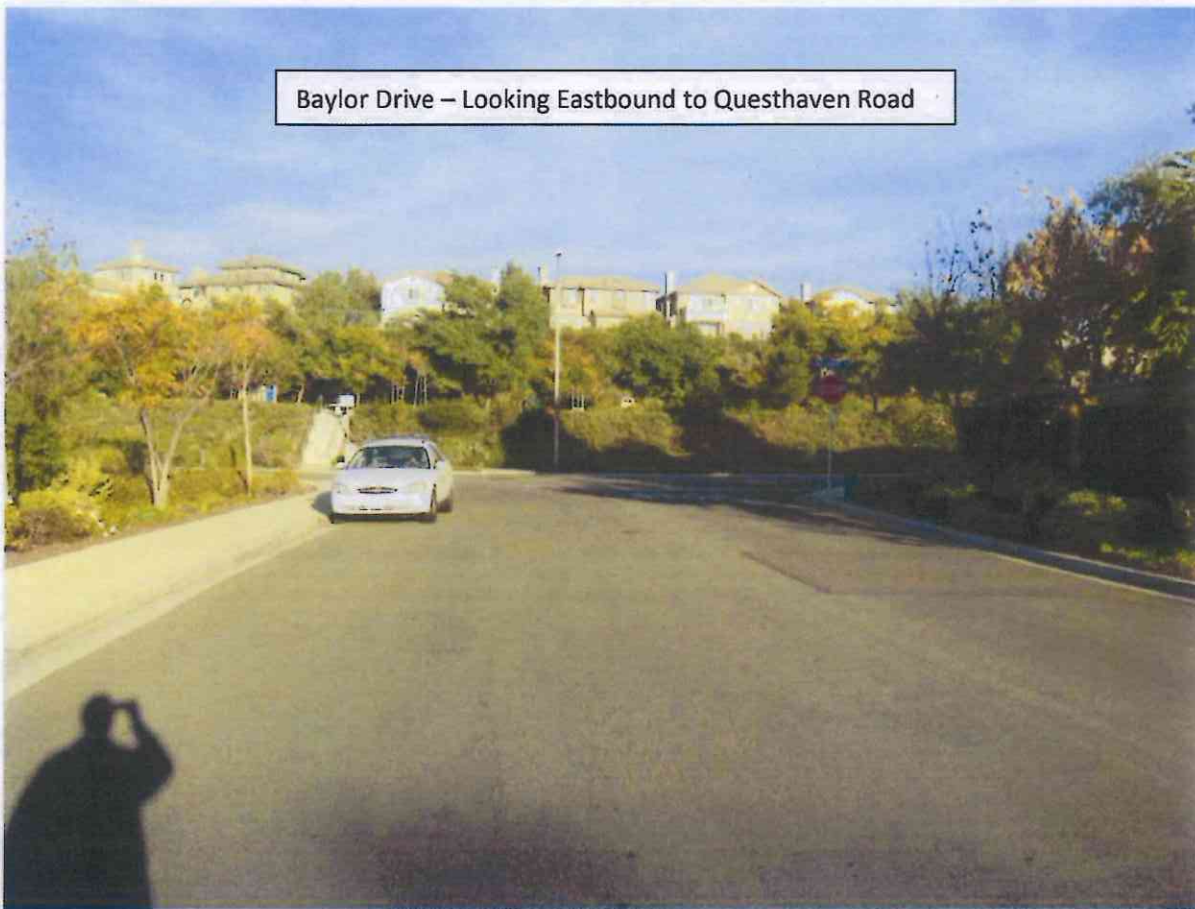

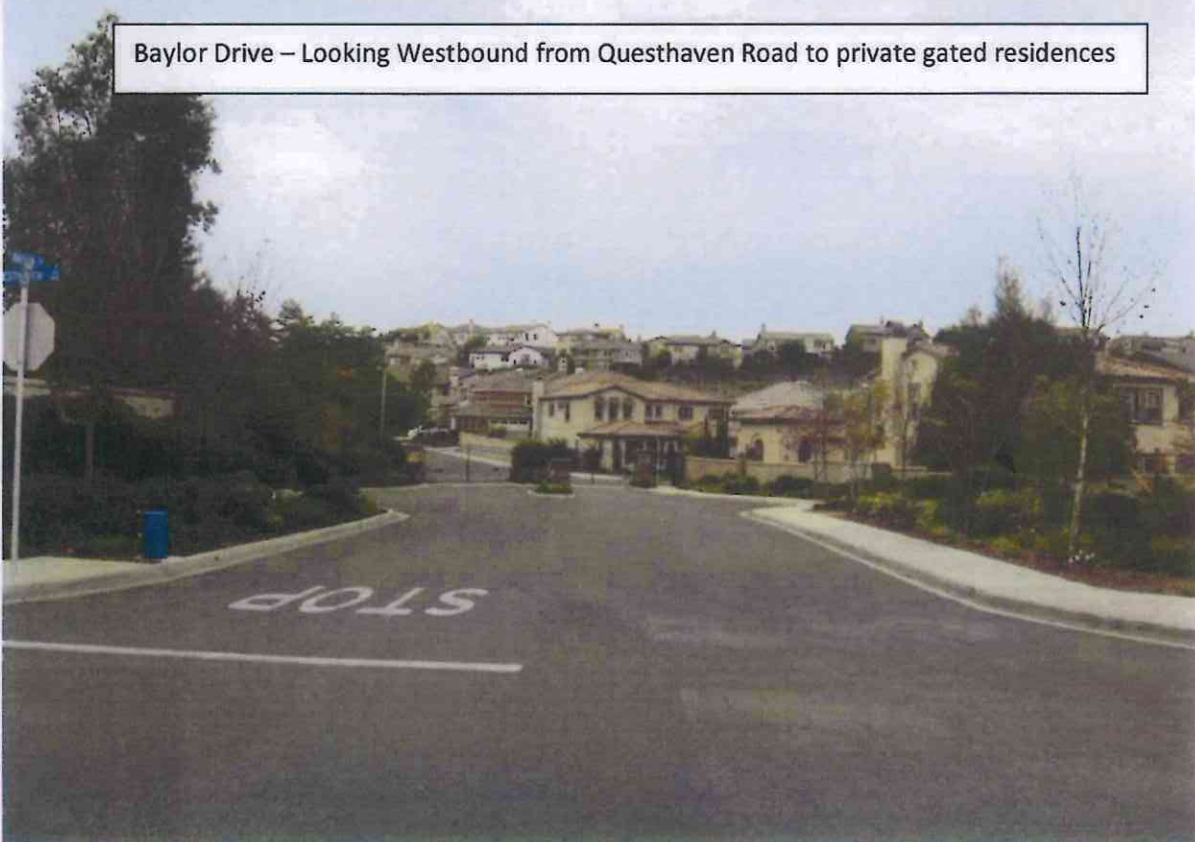

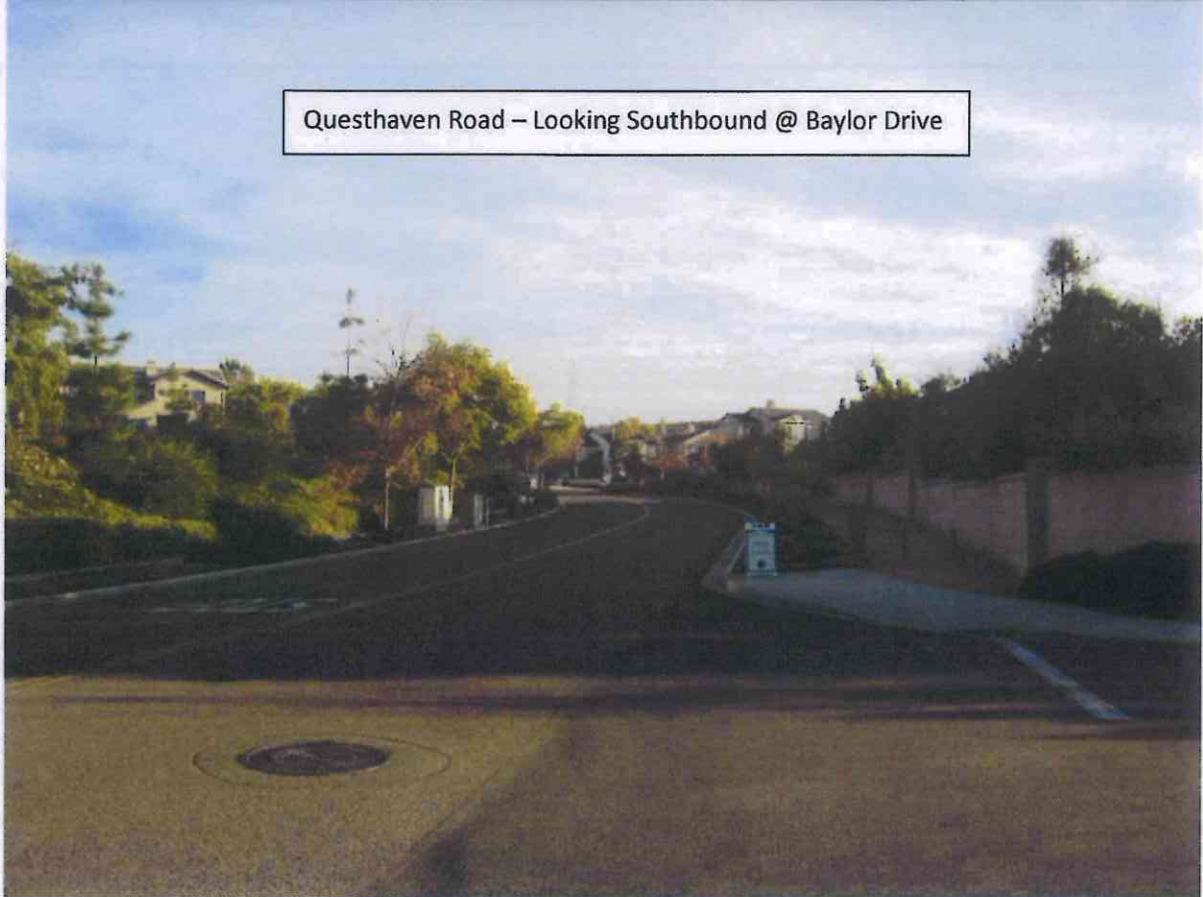

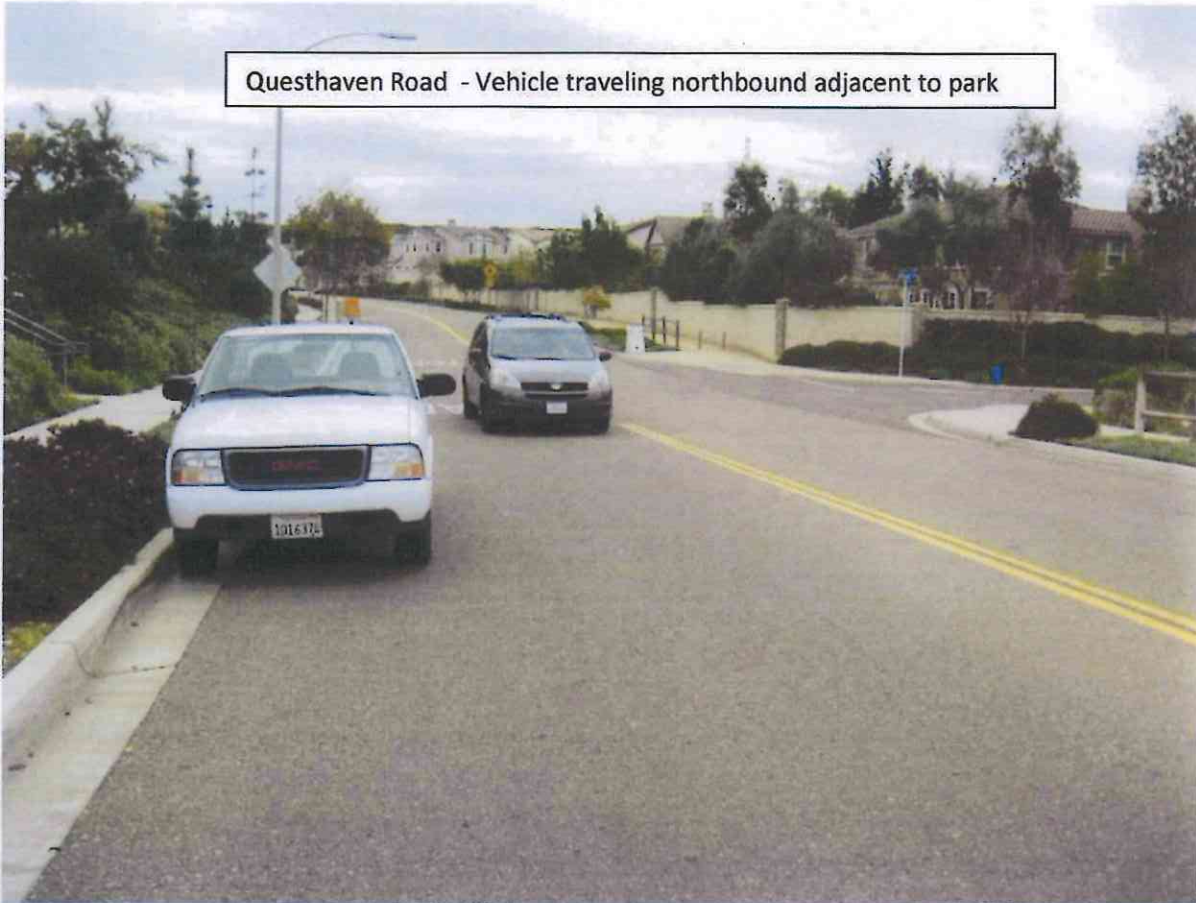

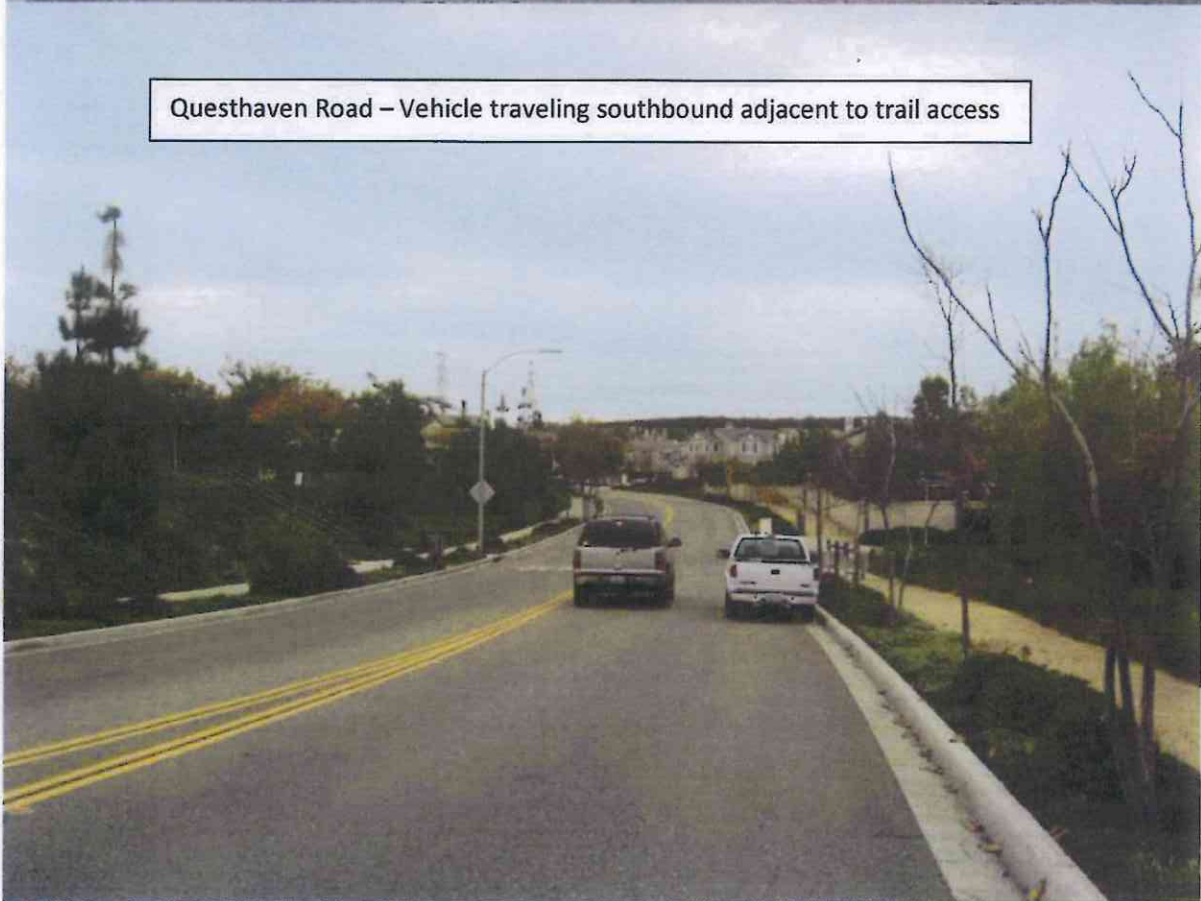

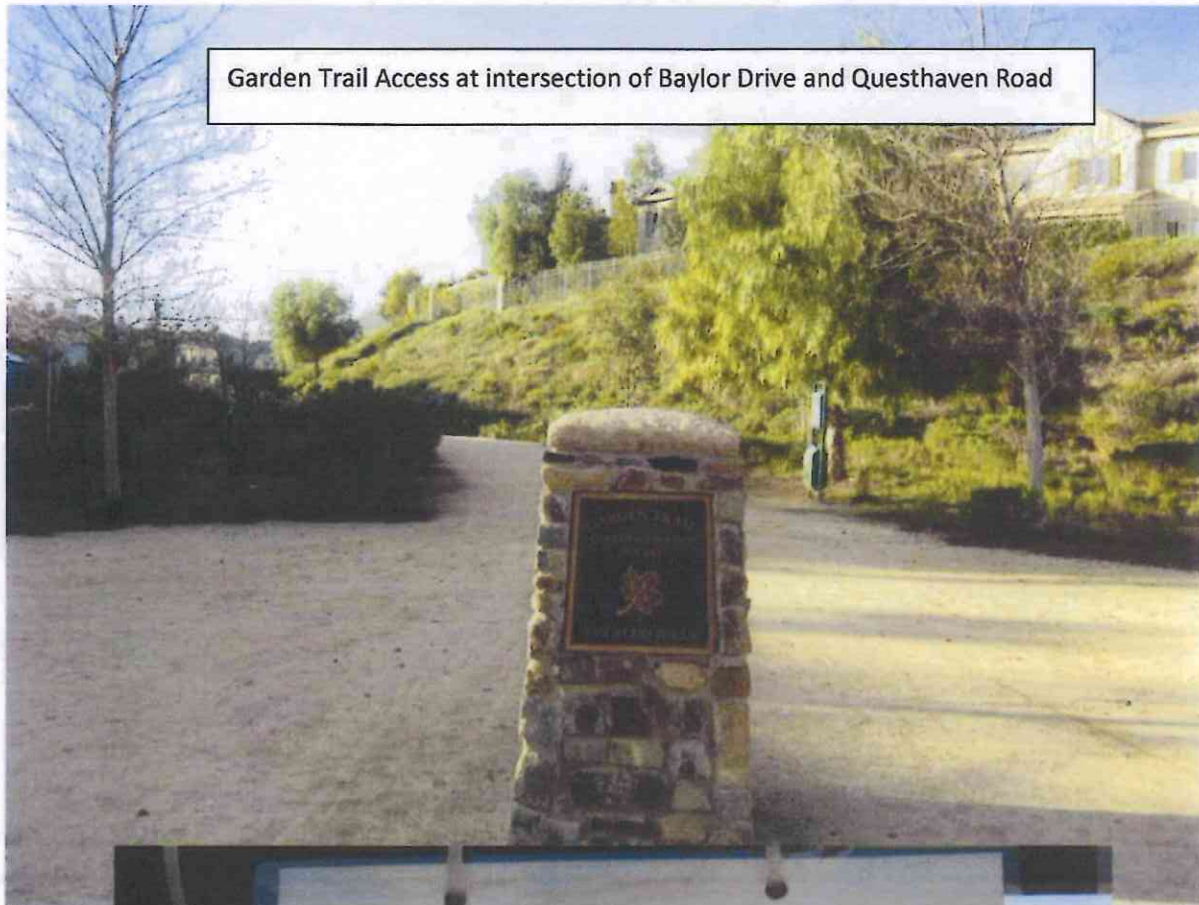

Yesterday, at about 2:50 PM, I went to Brightwood Avenue to monitor the situation involving the picking up of students.

Along with a team of SVPs and Motor Deputy Ronnie Hudson, I saw about 15 vehicles stop and pick up students. It was trash day, so the street was lined with the EDCO trash bins. This, along with our presence, could have affected the number of cars that came down to the cul de sac. A number of parents parked further up on Brightwood and walked down. We saw only one parking violation. Deputy Hudson spoke with the driver and educated her as to the proper parking positioning in a cul de sac.

We passed out flyers and spoke with the drivers, who all seemed very cooperative. Additionally, I spoke with two of the complainants, who approached and contacted me. We discussed the situation. I recommended that they contact their HOA to seek some type of legal solution, such as possibly restricting gate access. Also, Deputy Hudson and I assured them that the Sheriff's Department would conduct enforcement details as time and scheduling allowed. I gave them my business card and invited them to call me with any further concerns. We left at about 3:50 PM.

We will continue to monitor this problem.

- A suspicious man was sited on this street, parked during the pick uptime, staring at the children.
- School traffic is generating an average of 50 + cars, that is 200 trips per day on Brightwood Drive.

- Children are loitering after school due to the parents being late to pick up their child. Property has been vandalized and stolen.

These are issues to be considered and monitored.

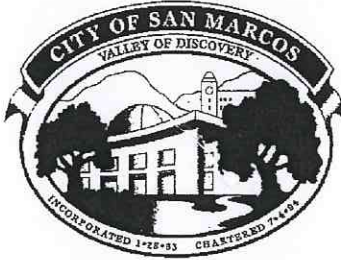

Dear Lydia,

I am responding regarding the notice dated February 9, 2011 pertaining to a request from residents of Brightwood Drive to have a community gate time-locked during the periods that students walk to and from school. I have attached the notice for reference.

It's to my understanding that the reason for the hearing, communicated to the city by the residents of Brightwood Drive, is because many parents use the cul-de-sac as a drop-off and pick-up point for their children and the residents are not happy with the increased volume of traffic on their street during those hours; therefore, posing a safety issue for the children. I can appreciate their concern for the safety of our children and I'm certain there is an underlying personal interest involved as well; however, locking the gate is not the answer and if I am correct, doing this would violate certain city codes pertaining to fire personnel access and public right-of-way access to the city's master planned trail system. This is a traffic issue and should be addressed accordingly by the city.

I live in a different neighborhood in San Elijo Hills and walk my 1st grader to school every morning (from our home) using the Brightwood route to the trail because it is the safest and most direct route to school from our home. My 3 year son also comes along in a stroller. The mornings are very calm on Brightwood; however, the afternoon is a different story. I have witnessed cars speeding (including a resident on Brightwood) and stopping in the middle of the street to pick-up their children after school. There is no structure for this increase in traffic flow and the city does need to address it.

Why cutting off trail access would be contrary to city plans:

According to "The Big Picture" as quoted on the city's Community Services & Parks and Recreation webpage:

"Perhaps the most important feature of our 72-mile trail system is that it promotes a CONTINUITY that allows different places in the city to connect to each other. Trail users will be able to safely and easily travel from point A to point B throughout the City! This CONNECTIVITY will unite the City and provide corridors to access work, **school**, and recreation."

There is an alternate route from Questhaven to access the trail down the street; however, this is not a safe route because of the steep, slippery incline/decline of the trail. Most people walk with strollers and this simply is not an option. I would take that route just to stay away from the Brightwood drama, but it is not safe to walk. Speaking of actions taken by the some of the Brightwood residents since this has all started, they have had the gate latch moved to the opposite side of the gate making it impossible for short children to reach up to open it. I had previously communicated this to Kimberly Perez, the San Elijo Hills Community Director. It is also difficult to maneuver the stroller and try to unlatch it from the other side. We live on a cul-de-sac street and our gate has a handle at waist level, as it should be located. Not to go off on a tangent, but as an example, what if there was a handicapped person in a wheel chair trying to access the latch at the Brightwood gate? They would not be able to reach it. (You're probably asking yourself what a person in a wheelchair would be doing on the trail in the first place. I know several athletic people with paraplegia who have extremely strong upper bodies that can maneuver a wheelchair down a decline.) The gate used to push/pull open as with other gates in the community but again, the Brightwood residents seemed to have had that changed and at that same time, they posted their own notices on the gate asking people to take a different route. The notices are still posted and this I know is against city code as well as our community CC&R's. Recently, a Brightwood resident set up

a Girl Scout Cookie sale directly blocking the gate in which I had to squeeze the stroller through to get by. It seems like they are trying to discourage people from using that route, and blocking a public-right-of-way violates city code 12:24.030.

In closing, I feel that the gate on Brightwood could not be locked for the following reasons:

1. The trail is part of the "Master Trail Plan" and is adjacent to a public right-of-way (the gate to the sidewalk as public access).
2. It is to my understanding that all cul-de-sac communities that are adjacent to the trail system have gates to access those trails. They are supposed to be unlocked at all times mainly for fire safety personnel access with the exception of "gated" communities that are required to have a "rapid entry system" in the event of a fire.
3. Crestview (neighborhood name) is NOT a gated community and again, is adjacent to a public trail offering a public right-of-way to that trail system.

Lastly, as I had mentioned, this seems to be a traffic issue that needs to be addressed, not a "gate" issue in an attempt to prevent the public from using a public street (Brightwood Drive) and sidewalks to access a public trail system. It seems like it would be more economically feasible to have a sheriff's deputy's presence available for two hours per day during the school year.

If the city decides to lock the gate on Brightwood, then the city needs to lock ALL cul-de-sac gates in the city of San Marcos. That doesn't seem reasonable, does it?

Thank you very much for the hearing notice and the opportunity to comment on this issue. We look forward to a positive outcome that will focus on the safety of the children, not one that would benefit personal interests of the Brightwood Drive cul-de-sac.

Please do not take my comments as being argumentative to you personally, they are simply meant to communicate facts and opinion on the subject matter.

Hello Lydia,

I am a resident of San Elijo Hills and use the Brightwood trail to daily walk my children to school. Though I can understand the concerns that the residents of Brightwood have brought to light, I nonetheless feel that the trail remain open to untimed public access for the following reasons:

1. San Elijo was founded on the principle of open trail access for all. Many of us have purchased property here with the ability to walk our children to both elementary and middle school as a deciding factor. Due to the steep incline the adjacent trail is not easily accessible to those individuals who push a stroller or whose children ride bikes to school. I push a double stroller it would be recklessly unsafe for me to take that route.
2. The public tax dollars have paid for the trail and as such it should remain available to all San Elijo residents who would like to use it. If the Brightwood residents were the only ones whose tax dollars had been used to create as well as maintain the trail then they might have a valid case for time locking the gate. However, that not being the case, all those whose money has contributed to the trail should have equal and untimed access to it.
3. As I understand it, the primary issue that the Brightwood residents have is the volume of afternoon traffic from 3:15-3:45. (Mornings are very calm on that street and even the sheriffs who were summoned by the Brightwood residents saw absolutely no problem with the morning traffic flow. It appears that the police have even found no problems with the afternoon traffic flow and the Brightwood residents are turning to the city to indirectly address the issue that they perceive as a problem -one has to wonder if there is a vested interest in this issue outside of the stated objectives.) Locking the gate is an indirect way of addressing the issue of traffic and it penalizes the walkers who have in no way contributed to the perceived problem.
4. In the event of an emergency circumstance, such as fire, a time locked gate leading to the nearest street, seems to be a very unsafe option.
5. If the Brightwood trail gate is locked in the afternoons there are many children who will be crossing the busy intersection at Questhaven. This will not only impede traffic flow on a major thoroughfare but will needlessly subject many children to potential harm (from cars, pedophiles, etc.)

In short, it seems that there are other available options other than denying access to a public trail. Perhaps a volunteer sheriff could patrol the area for 30 minutes daily. It seems like a sounder alternative than locking the gate. I'm sure that there are other solutions which will hopefully come to light at the meeting on Thursday.

I would like to introduce myself, my name is Erin Semel and I have lived in San Elijo Hills for 6 years now. When we purchased our homes we were told about the town center, the schools and over 18 miles of trails. These were all selling points for us and gave us the reason for purchasing here with much higher tax rate than say Discovery Hills area. We, like the other 7000 residents who live here loved the idea of a small community that could be self contained (to a point). Having the access to two outstanding schools right down the trail is exactly why we love living here.

Having said that I have seen the population triple in the time we moved into San Elijo Hills until now, and I know with growth some growing pains come as well. I am one of the people whose children use the trail at Brightwood in the morning and afternoon. I have heard the concern before with the residents in this area and I do understand why they might be bothered. On the other hand, when we moved into this community we actually looked at those houses and decided not to buy there because it was right at a trail head and we knew they were going to put the elementary school at the bottom. Dear Lydia Romero:

I am writing to you as a concerned San Elijo Hills Homeowner and Mother. I am vaguely familiar with this issue as my children and I use the gate to walk along the trail to and from school and also just to take walks many days of the year. We have seen the signs and the officers on the street.

My concerns are these:

1. This is a public walk through gate and a public street
2. This community prides itself on it's trails and the ability to walk, be outdoors and use the trails.
3. It is healthy for our children to walk to school, get exercise and breath fresh air. Our community should support that.
4. The more students that walk to school along the trails means less cars on the community streets. I would estimate at least 150-200 kids walk through this gate to get to school each day.
5. Dozens of people use this gate to walk the trails during these hours, not just students and their families walking to school.
6. In a community with as many young families and school-aged children as we have, there is going to be traffic during the hours of school drop off and pick up. I believe having our children walk on a safe trail is a better solution to keeping more cars off the road and keeping our children safe.
7. It is healthy to see the big picture and do what is best for the common good.

I am curious how the other homeowners on this block with school-aged children feel about the potential closure. This would mean if their children wanted to walk to school or if they wanted to take a walk in the designated hours, they would have to go way out of the way instead of using the gate at the end of their own block.

I understand the concern for safety and agree with that point. It seems to me since the complaints started and the officers have patrolled, the number of cars has decreased. I believe that if tickets were given for speeding or loitering, that would help the problem, if there is still a big problem. I have rarely seen children playing at these times as most of them are in school or napping. And even so, if your children are playing outside, they need to be supervised and learn to watch carefully for cars—this is a fact of life. If these parents are so concerned for safety, they could very feasibly let their children play ALL day long and have them come inside when school is being dismissed, 3:00-4pm. The 1-4 pm is completely unnecessary and exaggerated.

We would all like to close our streets off and make them completely safe for our children, but this should not be an option in a public community. I live on a small cul de sac, and after school there are people driving in and dropping kids off from school.

There are a lot of cars that circle in our street just to turn around. There is nothing I can do to stop them, and I surely wouldn't consider closing off my street to public traffic. In a community with as many young families and school-aged children as we have, there is going to be traffic during the hours of school drop off and pick up. I believe having our children walk on a safe trail is a better solution to keeping more cars off the road and keeping our children safe.

In conclusion, it saddens me that certain homeowners cannot bend for and see the most positive situation for the common good of the community. *I hope we can resolve this issue in the best way to benefit the most people in our small, close-knit community.*
